The Gathering

Invocation (Adapted from Words for Worship, Unitarian Universalist Association, by Ian W. Riddell)

One: Come, come, whoever you are. Do you hear that voice calling you, calling us?

All: That voice which calls us together today, in this room, made holy by our presence and by the sacred breath we share in our singing and speaking and silence.

One: That voice which calls us to remember that we are not alone and that we are inextricably linked to all other life—woven into a vast tapestry of existence of which we are a powerful, integral, and holy part.

Statement of Solidarity in the Face of Tragedy

One: People of faith, reason, and goodwill, as we recognize and celebrate faith neighbors today, let us also be mindful that our world has once again been upset by acts of violence—most notably with the October 7 attack of Israel by Hamas, and the ongoing conflict. No statement will capture all of the hurt, grief, or complexity. No statement will satisfy everyone. But this we affirm: we must stand with victims. We must stand against terrorism of any kind. We dare not look away from the pain and suffering of our fellow human beings. And if we pray, we must rise from our knees and do what we can to encourage real justice—for it is only from justice that any meaningful peace will come.

All: God of Mercy, heal our broken hearts. God of Peace, sustain our broken hearts. God of Comfort, encourage our broken hearts.

Veterans' Day Commemoration

(Adapted from the Rev. John Gundlach, Retired Navy Chaplain, and the UCC's minister for government chaplaincies)

Response Reading & Prayer

- One: In commemoration of Veterans' Day in the United States, we honor all of those among us who have served in the military. Today we hear words that have not always been offered, "Thank you for your service."
- All: Though these words will never go far enough to bring healing for some wounds, it is one small but important way to acknowledge what veterans have given, especially to the nation they serve.
- One: Though we hate war—and we may disagree about the justifications for particular wars—it is important to recognize the sacrifices of those who have served on our behalf, and to care for them in return.
- All: As people of faith, we acknowledge that we are not yet on the Mountain of the LORD—the place where swords will be transformed into tools of peace.
- One: We still live in the "already" and "not yet" world, where we must strive for peace, with hope to guide us. And so we pray:
- All: God of All Nations, where pain persists, we ask you to heal the wounds of our veterans. Give them peace so they may enjoy the fullness of their lives. We offer thanks for our veterans. Help us to care enough to give them the respect and honor they are due, and strengthen our resolve to build a world modeled on your realm, where war will be pursued no more. This we ask of you, God of Peace. Amen

Interfaith Wisdom on Peace and Justice

Wisdom from Judaism

First Reading Micah 4:1-4

In days to come the mountain of the LORD's house shall be established as the highest of the mountains, and shall be raised up above the hills. Peoples shall stream to it, and many nations shall come and say: "Come, let us go up to the mountain of the LORD, to the house of the God of Jacob; that he may teach us his ways and that we may walk in his paths." For out of Zion shall go forth instruction, and the word of the LORD from Jerusalem. ³ He shall judge between many peoples, and shall arbitrate between strong nations far away; they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more; ⁴ but they shall all sit under their own vines and under their own fig trees, and no one shall make them afraid; for the mouth of the LORD of hosts has spoken.



Responsive Reading (From the Task Force on Soviet Jewry of the URJ, 1979)

One: This is our truth: the One God calls forth being from nothingness, and makes all things one.

All: Blessed is the Holy One of Israel, in whose Oneness we are one.

One: But we are not yet one in fact: our human race is broken into fragments, and we wait to be redeemed into a lasting unity.

All: Blessed is the time to come, when all will at last be one.

One: While hatred rules the earth, redemption will not come.

All: Let the day be near when love will rule this world.

One: Until people return from their exile from each other, redemption will not come.

All: Let all exile be ended: our exile from one another, the exile of God's presence from our lives.

One: Until we restore the lawless to their true selves and rekindle in them the spark of God, redemption will not come.

All: Let us also search out the flaws in our own souls, and struggle to remove them.

One: While we care only for ourselves, redemption will not come.

All: Let our hearts be moved by the misery of others and dare what must be dared.

Wisdom from Christianity

Second Reading Matthew 5:1-10

When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up the mountain; and after he sat down, his disciples came to him. ² Then he began to speak, and taught them, saying: ³ "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. ⁴ "Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted. ⁵ "Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth. ⁶ "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled. ⁷ "Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy. ⁸ "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God. ⁹ "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God. ¹⁰ "Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.



Responsive Reading (From, "A Network of Mutuality," by Martin Luther King, Jr.)

One: We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied to a single garment of destiny.

All: Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere.

One: There are some things in our social system to which all of us ought to be maladjusted.

All: Hatred and bitterness can never cure the disease of fear, only love can do that.

One: We must evolve for all human conflict a method which rejects revenge, aggression, and retaliation.

All: The foundation of such a method is love.

One: Before it is too late, we must narrow the gaping chasm between our proclamations of peace and our lowly deeds which precipitate and perpetuate war [and violence].

All: One day we must come to see that peace is not merely a distant goal that we seek but a means by which we arrive at that goal.

One: We must pursue peaceful ends through peaceful means.

All: We shall hew out of a mountain of despair, a stone of hope.
